

### Job Corps: FY 2018 Member Request Summary for Staff

1. FY 2017 Final Action: Provide Job Corps total funding support at no less than Senate level of \$1,709,955,000.
2. FY 2018 Bill: Two requests to be included as highest priority in the LHHS House Member database and Senate staff to provide to the Senate LHHS Appropriations Subcommittee;
  - a. FY 2018 Funding: No less than \$1,709,955,000.
  - b. Report Language: **Job Corps Program.**—The Committee expresses its appreciation to the Job Corps program and its efforts to train low income young adults. The work is critical not only to these young trainees but also to the economy. The Committee directs the Secretary of Labor to develop a working group with the leadership of Job Corps, industry, and other appropriate members to identify how Job Corps can be used to support urban renewal, job creation, and the economy. The effort should consider potential new public-private partnership and ways to reduce the regulatory burden on the program and employers.
